As we have stated before, the importance of this meeting cannot be stressed enough; the club generates about **half of our revenue** from this single event, which helps support our speaker program, fly tying classes, and all the other events participated in by the club.

Auction Guidelines

1. Bring items to donate.

DEER CREEK CADDIS

Instructions by Bill "Woody" Woodward Photograph by Bob Cain



Recipe

nookScuu/Pupa, Size 10 - 12
ThreadChartreuse, 6/0 or 8/0
BodyChartreuse UTC wire, medium, covered with UV resin or epoxy
RibOlive peacock herl
HackleGrizzly hen hackle, dyed olive
WingNatural CDC
Antenna/HornsPheasant tail fibers
ThoraxDiamond Brite dubbing (or equivalent), bronze peacock
HeadThread

Instructions:

- 1. Attach the wire about 1/3rd of the way down the hook bend and wrap it forward in tight touching turns to about an 1/8" behind the hook eye and trim it off. Make sure the wraps are tight with no gaps. If there are gaps, use your fingernails to push the wraps together. Cover the entire wire body with a light coating of resin and treat it with a UV light to set it.
- 2. Tie in the thread at the rear of the wire body and wrap down the bend for 5-6 wraps. Let the thread hang.
- 3. Select a peacock herl and tie it in at the end of the thread wraps by the tip (be sure to cut off the first 1/2" of the herl to assure you avoid the weakest part of the herl) with the length of it going out behind the hook bend. Cover the peacock herl butt with thread wraps back to end of the wire body. Remove any excess herl and palmer the thread in even wraps to the front of the body like a rib. Let the thread hang.
- 4. Now coat the entire wire body and the thread tag behind it with a light coating of UV resin, then palmer wrap the peacock herl in slightly spaced wraps (similar to the thread wraps going up the body) up the wire body and through the resin to the front of the body and tie it off. This should create the effect of body segments. Remove any excess herl and treat the entire body with a UV light to set the resin.
- 5. Select a hackle feather and tie it in tight against the front of the body. Stroke all the hackle fibers back and wrap it forward for three wraps and tie it off. Remove any excess hackle. The fiber tips should reach back to the area of the hook barb. Stroke all the hackle fibers back toward the hook bend and make a few wraps of thread over the butts to ensure that they lay back over the body.
- 6. Select a CDC feather and tie it in on **top of the hook shank** tight against the base of the hackle. The tips of the CDC feathers should reach back over the top of the body to about above the hook barb. Trim off any excess CDC butt and cover any remaining butt with thread wraps.
- 7. Select 2 pheasant tail feather barbs and tie one in at the base of and on each side of the wing. The tips of the barbs should reach back just past the back of the bend of the hook.
- 8. Dub the thread and wrap it forward from the base of the wing to behind the hook eye forming a well shaped thorax. *The thorax should be slightly thicker than the body*. Remove any excess dubbing and form a small thread head, whip finish, and cut the thread. Apply head cement to the head, if desired.

January Speaker Re-Cap

Ethan Simmons, Biologist with ODNR, was our speaker for the January meeting. The topic of his presentation was state's ongoing brown trout study.

Ethan began his talk with a little history about ODNR's work with trout stocking in Ohio, from the early days up to the present. The state currently stocks a total of about 25,000 brown trout each year into the Mad and Clear Fork Rivers, as well as Clear Creek. However, there is very little data available about these brown trout fisheries to determine fundamentals such as growth rates, survival rates and fish movement.

Answering these questions is among the goals the state hopes to accomplish with the brown trout study. Their approach is:

- 1. Tag released fish to differentiate year class and release location.
- 2. Record the size/number/location of these tagged fish during the late summer and early spring fish surveys (electro-shock).
- 3. Map steam habitat mapping using sonar / GPS.

A couple of interesting bits of information so far from the study:

- 1. Browns in the Mad seem to do fairly well, even in last year's drought.
- So far, most of the brown trout do not seem to move far from where they are stocked.

The data from this multi-year study will be analyzed by the state, and presented to groups such as our club, to help the state determine how to best manage these fisheries into the future. Look for more information to come!


